### Criminal Justice Major Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science

The Criminal Justice major is a four-year program that consists of two tracks: general criminal justice and law enforcement. Our criminal justice instructors are former and current practitioners, so opportunities are provided for students to build professional contacts and to explore areas of interest throughout the criminal justice network. The law enforcement track has been granted provisional certification to provide the academic component of the Professional Peace Officer Education (PPOE). Students in both tracks are required to participate in internships, which collaborate with federal, state, county, and local agencies. The degree is granted upon completion of 125 credits as specified on pages 41-42 (40 credits must be in 3000- or 4000-level courses).
